THE 12 YEAR PLAN TO REMOVE ALL RELIGIOUS EXEMPTIONS, PERSONAL BELIEF EXEMPTIONS, AND MEDICAL EXEMPTIONS BASED ON DOCTORS' PROFESSIONAL JUDGMENT

1. AB-2109. Form CDPH 8262; and Personal Belief Exemption + Religious Exemption = Personal "Beliefs" Exemption.

Initiated by Unidentified Legislative Attorneys and Assembly Member Richard Pan.

On September 30, 2012, Former Governor Jerry Brown directed the Department of Public Health (DPH) to oversee parents' applications for personal belief exemption for their children's childhood vaccines. Form CDPH 8262 was created for parents and doctors to sign. (See <https://as.sdsu.edu/useruploads/files/forms/children-center/personalbeliefsimmunizations.pdf>.) The governor also directed DPH to allow for a separate religious exemption on the form. Now, both personal belief exemption and religious exemption were being combined on the same form and the title was strategically named as *Personal Beliefs [plural] Exemption to Required Immunizations*. Going forward, parents and the public were conditioned to claim personal beliefs [plural] exemptions and not consider claiming religious exemptions.

2. SB-277. Personal "Beliefs" Exemptions Were Being Faded Out and Would be Good Until Next Grade Span; Parents Were Now being Directed to Get Medical Exemptions So Their Children Could be Grandfathered-In Until the Next Grade Span.

On June 30, 2015, Former Governor Brown approved SB-277 and it was codified as Health & Safety Code section 120370. In the next six (6) months, children could still claim personal "beliefs" exemptions for childhood vaccines for school attendance until the next grade span.

On and after January 1, 2016, for the ones without personal “beliefs” exemptions, they must be vaccinated or claim medical exemptions (MEs).

Now, personal belief exemptions and religious exemptions were both being removed by this single bill, SB-277, but because the attention was directed to focus on the removal of personal beliefs exemptions and the implementation of how to get MEs, many did not know religious exemptions were actually being taken away silently.

The 1st Amendment states that “Congress shall make no law respecting an establishment of religion or prohibiting the free exercise thereof.” This is the free exercise clause. “[L]aws that burden an individual’s ability to practice his religion are subject to strict scrutiny unless they are neutral and generally applicable.” (See *Church of the Lukumi Babalu Aye, Inc. v. Hialeah* (1993) 508 U.S. 520, 531.) “All laws are selective to some extent, but categories of selection are of paramount concern when a law has the incidental effect of burdening religious practice.” (*Id.* at 452.) “[W]hen the government makes a value judgment in favor of secular motivations, but not religious motivations, the government’s actions must survive heightened scrutiny.” When strict scrutiny applies, the government must show its burden on religion is “justified by a compelling governmental interest and [is] narrowly tailored to advance that interest.” (*Id.* at 532.) Here, religious exemptions were removed quietly, and the Legislature did not narrowly tailor SB-277 to advance parents’ and children’s free exercise of religion in obtaining vaccine exemptions. As such SB-277 violates their free exercise rights.

3. SB-276. DPH to Use CAIR System as of January 1, 2021. The Grandfathered-In Children’s Medical Exemptions Would Still Be Unconditionally Valid Until Next Grade Span.

4. SB-714. Per Senator Richard Pan, this Bill Made Minor and Technical Changes to SB-276. It Turned Out That This Bill Made a Material Change to Revoke Medical Exemptions of the Grandfathered-In Children If Their Medical Exemption Writing Doctors Were Under Disciplinary Actions. The Public Did Not Get a Chance to Support or Oppose this Material Change.

There were many amendments in this bill to amend SB-276 and there was a material change, adding provisions to revoke the grandfathered-in children's MEs when their doctors were subject to disciplinary actions. Many families lost their MEs in recent years because the Medical Board of California has wrongfully placed most of the medical exemption writing doctors under disciplinary actions. Repealing this bill would restore the constitutional and fundamental rights of the children to education and the parents' constitutional and fundamental rights to choose schools for their children for enrollment.
